

MRS. BARLOW STILL HOLDS GOLF TITLE

Individual Champion Retains Local Honor by Defeating Miss Griscom in Finals

Both Women Play Up to Top Form and Match Is One of Best Contests Seen Over Merion Links

Mrs. Ronald H. Barlow retains her title as individual champion of the Women's Golf Association of Philadelphia by right of her victory of yesterday in the final round of the struggle over the Merion Links against her clubmate and former national, as well as local champion, Miss Frances C. Griscom.

Miss Griscom had the satisfaction of winning the first hole, but after this it was really a stern chase for her throughout the struggle. Mrs. Barlow had squared matters at the third hole and really took what proved to be the winning lead at the seventh, where Miss Griscom was stymied. The eighth was halved after Mrs. Barlow had missed a long putt for the hole by a few inches, and missing a short putt on the ninth green. Mrs. Barlow had her lead cut down to a single hole, where the turn for home was made. Miss Griscom missed a putt of a club's length on the tenth green, and the mistake cost her the hole, and at the eleventh, with both on the green in 4, a half in 6 resulted.

It was Mrs. Barlow who quickly followed into trouble, and after over-running the hole and playing her next too hard, Miss Griscom took the hole 7 to 6. With Miss Griscom holing out a long putt on the seventeenth green, the match was brought all square amidst the greatest excitement. Then they played the home hole. Miss Griscom's second stroke lodged on the top of the bunker, but she was well out on her third, and her fourth was a long ball. Mrs. Barlow's second went into the bunker on the left, and then it was that she played the stroke that practically landed her the championship. She took a brassie to bring her out of the difficulty, and was on the green in a stroke better than her opponent. Miss Griscom tried to gobble a long putt to save the situation, but in this she failed, and it was Mrs. Barlow's match by 1 up, and with it went the championship title. The card follows:

The Defeated Eight Cup of the tournament was won by Miss H. Ethel Magle, of Merion, who defeated Miss Frances Dallett, of St. Davids, in the final round by 3 up and 1 to play.

QUAKER GOLFERS LOSE

Philadelphia's men golfers went down in sad defeat yesterday before the invading hosts from the Boston district in the tri-city team matches for the Lesley trophy, at the links of the Merion Cricket Club, at Haverford. It was a 36-hole affair, the rounds being split up in two ball and four ball matches. In the singles the Philadelphians were beaten 7 points to 3, while in the foursomes there were two matches that went against the Quakers to one in their favor, while the other two were halved. This left the day's play in favor of the Bostonians by 9 points to 4, and as a consequence of their victory they will meet the New York team for the trophy today.

With a course admittedly in somewhat poor shape after the trying weather conditions of the preceding days, there was little excuse for the downfall of the local players. The Boston team was well balanced, and played golf that was an eye-opener to many of their opponents. H. H. Wilder, the young Harvard expert, for instance, swept G. A. Cramp literally off his feet by playing golf of the record-breaking order. He was 3 under bogie on the outward journey, and then finished with a 79, a stroke better than the bogie for the course, as follows:

This was the best golf of the day. W. P. Smith, who captained the Philadelphia contingent, had the satisfaction of winning his match from J. G. Thorp, a notable golfer in national circles. They were all square at the ninth, but a 4 at the twelfth hole, after running down a 30-foot putt, and then a remarkable 2 at the thirteenth, gave Smith the lead, which he retained to the end.

BALTIMORE TROTS

BALTIMORE, Oct. 26 (Special).—At the Gentlemen's Driving Park this afternoon Agnus Pointer and Emboy created new track records. In the free-for-all Agnus Pointer won in straight heats, and by pacing the first heat in 2:01 1/4, clipped one second off the previous mark, which was held jointly by Major Mascovite, Eddie Powers and Bedaworth, Jr. Emboy, the winner of the Gentlemen's Driving Park Stake in the straights, won the third heat easily in 2:12 1/4, which was the fastest heat ever trotted over the course. It was by far the best day of the racing.
