STIRRING FINISH KINGDON BY COY MAID

Kingston's Game Daughter Barely Defeats Her Near Relative, Dolly Spanker, at Jamaica Track.

BIG COUP ON FRANK GILL

John W. Gates Wagers with Every Club House Commissioner on McGinnis' Colt—Keator Left at Post.

All parts of the capacious building of the Metropolitan Jockey Club at the Jamaica track were well filled yesterday, the weather being extremely favorable to outdoor sport.

At least two of them, the Lynbrook and Southold handiaps, were particularly profitable to John McGinnis, whose colt, Frank Gill, won the former, while Coy Maid trained in his stable, barely succeeded in defeating her near relative, Dolly Spanker, in the Southold Handicap, in which little Garner, on the winner, held his own against Miller on Dolly Spanker.

John W. Gates had a big bet down on Frank Gill, he offering all the club house commissioners \$50 each way, and some of them took his wager, while others begged to be excused. On Coy Maid less money was won by Mr. Gates, because of the strong tip on Oxford and Dolly Spanker, which McGinnis offered the most exciting finish of the meeting.

Fortunes were lost when Miller, on Keator, was left at the post in the first race. Dolly Spanker, on the other hand, "Cad" Doggett on Keator at 1 to 2, and with others knocked out \$4,000. The horses were so long at the post that Keator repeatedly Johnson but by Perry, became sore, and when the barrier was released the crowd to "green and white" on Keator standing alone, the others streaming far away in front. Even when Miller hit the colt with his whip Keator did not break. It was a new development in this race. The race was won by Alencon, which had been racing at Butler's.
