

TRI-CITY GOLF CONTEST.

TO BE PLAYED ON THE MERWIN CRICKET CLUB LINKS.

New York, Philadelphia, and Boston Represented — Junior and Women's Tournaments at Haverford — Professionals at Forest Hill — Good Golf at the Myopia Hunt Club.

On October 26 and 27 the Tri-City matches between teams of twelve players of Boston, New York, and Philadelphia, for the Lesley cup, will be played on the course of the Merion Club at Haverford, Pa. The first day Boston will play against Philadelphia, and the survivors of that match will play off with New York. At a meeting of the executive committee of the Golf Association of Philadelphia, and the special advisory committee of players, the following team was selected to represent Philadelphia: R. E. Griscom, H. W. Perrin, A. W. Tillington, Simon Carr, H. P. McFarland, W. P. Smith (captain), A. H. Smith, R. E. Hansen, George A. Crump, F. O. Horstman, H. P. Smith, H. L. Wilson; substitute, Frazier Harrison and George J. Cook.

Under the amendment to the deed of gift the captains have the privilege of selecting any ten players from the list of twelve to play in either the morning or afternoon matches, but no substitution of players is to be made after the morning or afternoon match has started. The Philadelphians have selected William Poultry Smith as captain of their team, and the New York team have chosen Mr. William J. Travis to be the captain of their team.

Mr. Travis is the well-known golfer, who won the English championship a few years ago, being at the time the American champion. The Boston captain has not yet been announced. It is expected that this event will bring together the leading players of the Metropolitan, New England, and Philadelphia districts, and will excite great interest on account of the representative players selected to play for the various associations mentioned.

The junior competition for the cup offered for the best Philadelphia team has been won by the Merion Cricket Club's representatives, who went through the season without losing a single match. While this is the first year of prizes for the juniors, the boys, who are interested in golf have begun to play vigorously, and to enter into the spirit of the game. As a result of the initiation of this competition many of the juniors are out daily practising on the links of the several clubs. The individual junior championship will be held on the links of the Merion Club at Haverford, Pa., on October 18, 19, and 20, and it is to be hoped that a representative field of junior golfers under the age of eighteen years will take part. The time of the closing of the entries, which was fixed for Monday, has been extended to Thursday afternoon, so that the entire field of the junior players of Philadelphia may be afforded an opportunity to take part in the tournament, which is for a cup presented by Mr. Winthrop Sargent. This will go to the club whose representative wins the match. In addition to this there will be medals for the winner and the runner-up, presented by the Golf Association of Philadelphia.

The women's individual championship of Philadelphia for 1906 will be played on the links of the Merion Cricket Club, at Haverford, Pa., on October 22, 23, 24, and 25, under the rules of the United States Golf Association. The programme follows:

Monday, October 22—10 A. M., medal play round, 18 holes. Best sixteen scores to qualify for championship-match play. Prize for lowest score. Cup for defeated eight; cup for best eight scores failing to qualify; approaching and putting contest, and driving.

Tuesday, October 23—10 A. M., match play round, 18 holes.

Wednesday, October 24—10 A. M., second match play round. Consolation handicaps for those who do not qualify; handicaps limited to 18 strokes, 18 holes, medal play.

Thursday, October 25—10 A. M., third match play round. Handicap versus bogey. Open to all contestants; prize presented by Merion Cricket Club.

Friday, October 26—10 A. M., final match play round, women's championship; prize for champion and runner-up.

The executive committee of the Eastern Professional Golfers' Association has decided that only members of that body will be eligible to compete in its annual championship tournament, to be held on the Forest Hill Field Club links on Tuesday, October 22. There are about eighty members of the association now; but even so, a number of well known professionals in the East have failed to join. They have still time to get within the fold if they so desire.

On the afternoon of the second day, October 24, the plan is to have well known amateur team up with the professionals in tourney matches.

Walter J. Travis won his way to the final round of the Myopia Hunt Club tournament at Hamilton, Mass., yesterday by beating W. C. Chick in the semi-finals by 2 up. The other match in this round was unfinished. E. J. Myers and W. P. Smith being all square in nineteen holes, when darkness prevented further play. The second round required thus: W. P. Smith of Philadelphia defeated T. G. Stevenson of Myopia, 5 up and 4 to play; Eben M. Byers of Pittsburg defeated Hugo R. Johnstone of Myopia; 5 up and 4 to play; W. J. Travis of Garden City defeated Arden M. Robbins of Garden City, 3 up and 2 to play; W. C. Chick of Oakley defeated P. W. Whittemore of the Country Club of Boston, 2 up and 1 to play.

SCHAFFER—HOPPE.

World's Championship at 181 Billiards to Be Contested Tonight.

Jacob Schaefer will meet "Willie" Hoppe in the Madison Square Garden concert hall to-night in a game for the world's championship at 18-inch balk-line billiards, one shot in, beginning at eight o'clock. Hoppe is the present champion, having won the title from Maurice Vignaux in Paris on January 15, 1906, by a score of 560 to 223. George F. Blossom challenged Hoppe, and the match was played at the Grand Central Palace, in this city, on March 28, 1906. Hoppe won by a score of 560 to 391, and retained the title. The first world's championship tournament at 181 billiards was played in the concert hall at Madison Square Garden

from November 20 to December 4, 1897. The contestants were the order of finish, below: George F. Blossom, Jacob Schaefer, Frank C. Ives, Maurice Daly, and George H. Sutton. Schaefer wrested the title away from Sutton on February 5, 1893, when he defeated him in the concert hall at Madison Square Garden by a score of 600 to 596. The title passed to Ives on April 4, 1898, when he defeated Schaefer in the Central Music Hall, in Chicago, by a score of 600 to 426. There was no challenge outstanding, and Ives declined to accept the emblem, so, under the rules, it reverted to the donors, the Brunswick-Balke-Coleender Company, and there was no contest again until 1901.

The second world's championship tournament at 181 billiards was played in the concert hall at Madison Square Garden on December 2 to 10, 1901. The contestants and order of finish were: Schaefer, Blossom, Barstul, Sutton, Morningstar, and Howison. This gave Schaefer the 181 championship for the second time. Sutton challenged Schaefer from Paris, and, as the latter refused to defend the title, it was awarded to Sutton on October 26, 1903. On March 4, 1904, Vignaux defeated Sutton in Paris by a score of 560 to 387, and took the title. Vignaux held the championship in order since its inception, in 1897, to the present time, are therefore, as follows: Blossom, Schaefer, Ives, Schaefer, Sutton, Vignaux and Hoppe ("Wizard" Schaefer, it will be noted, is the only player who has held the title twice. Sutton is the only holder who has won the championship by default).

Practice games played yesterday resulted thus: Schaefer 260, John Daly 94; Blossom 500, Cline 125.

CHAMPAGNE STAKES TO-DAY.

Two-Year-Olds to Go Seven Furlongs at Belmont Park.

The Champagne Stakes, for two-year-olds, at seven furlongs, with \$5,000 added, will be the chief feature of to-day's card at Belmont Park, and a good field is announced to start. With such as W. H.
