### COVETED LESLEY GOLF CUP BROUGHT BACK TO NEW YORK

#### Metropolitan Team Defeats Massachusetts by 9 to 6—Travis, Douglas, Ward and Tiffany Score in Both Singles and Doubles.

(Special to The Eagle.) The Lesley Cup returns to New York after a year in Boston, for the Metropolitan golf team today defeated the Massachusetts representatives by the score of 9 to 6. There were ten singles matches and five foursomes, the local players leading 6 to 4 at the close of the morning play to 4 at the close of the ordinary element of interest in a golf match was the team spirit, and the twenty contestants were keyed up to the highest pitch. It was a day of magnificent golf, and some singularly low scores were the result.

The final score would tend to make the matches seem rather uneven, but as a matter of fact the issue was in doubt until late in the afternoon. The Metropolitan team had only been able to get the lead in the singles matches through a certain amount of good luck, and at the very last moment. With eight of the matches in, the two teams were all square and the excitement ran high. The lead proved to be commanding enough, however, to win the day, for it would have been necessary for the visitors to win four out of five of the doubles matches.

#### The Metropolitan Point Winners.

Walter J. Travis, Findlay S. Douglas, Max Behr, John M. Ward were the point winners for the Metropolitan team in the singles matches. In the foursomes Tiffany and Travis were responsible for another point. Ward and Douglas another, and two of the players beaten in the morning brought in the last in the persons of Gardner W. White and W. L. Hicks, who won on the nineteenth green. As a team, these two latter players go perfectly together, and in the two days of play succeeded in winning out against apparently overwhelming odds.

### DARING AUTO DRIVERS BARELY ESCAPE DEATH

#### Car Turns Turtle in Race on Guttenberg Track, But Driver and Mechanician Escape Injuries.

A large and enthusiastic crowd witnessed the automobile races on the old Guttenberg race track, near Fort Lee, yesterday afternoon. Besides seeing good competition, the spectators also saw hair raising escapes from death by one of the contestants.

The accident happened in the five-mile free-for-all race, when Henry Koonman, while on the third mile, lost control of his car and ran off the track. The car was traveling so fast that when it struck the inner rail it bounded into the air and turned turtle twice.

Both the mechanician and driver were thrown under the car, and for a moment it was thought that both had been killed. When they were lifted from under the wreckage, both were found to be all right, with the exception that each was badly shaken-up. The race was immediately called off by the referee. At the time of the accident, De Palma driving a Simplex was in the lead.

De Palma was the bright particular star of the day. Besides winning every event in which he started, he broke the two track record for which he tried. The one-mile mark he bettered by 1-15 seconds, and in the 5-mile event, he slipped more than 29 seconds off the old record.
