As a result the local players have earned the right to play the Massachusetts team in the final match to-day.

Conditions could not have been much worse when the golfers teed up for the singles in the morning. The rain pelted down in sheets, making it difficult to keep from slipping, while the grips of the clubs became almost too wet to hold. Ιť had been expected that Jerome D. Travers, the metropolitan champion, would be on the team, but the committee received word on Thursday night to the effect that he could not play. C. W. Inslee, who had been chosen, was found ineligible because his residence is now up the State beyond the fifty-five-mile M. G. A. limit. The first named finished two down to Crump, while White never had a chance with Heyburn. The longest match of the morning resulted in the playing of Hicks and C. B. Buxton. The Pennsylvania man won the home hole squaring the match, only to lose on the twentieth green. With a lead of two matches to start the afternoon foursomes the Metropolitan
