

for the right to meet the 1912 holders of the trophy. Interest centered chiefly on the individual match between the amateur and open champions—Travers and Ouimet. They were followed by a large and rather boisterous gallery which went wild when Travers having the match well in hand lost it on the 20th hole. Ouimet was showing wear and tear, and the reaction after his sensational victory over Vardon and Ray was beginning to show.

It cropped out the next day when he played very indifferently against Worthington and as a consequence he suffered one of the very few reverses of the year.

The amateur champion appeared to be an easy winner when the turn was reached but he fell off badly coming home, and with victory in his grasp on the first of the extra holes he missed an easy putt. On the twentieth, his second, being a trifle strong, found a trap, and the contest was over. It is not often that a golfer finds his misfortunes applauded, but in this instance the amateur champion was visibly annoyed and righteously indignant because of the rowdy element in the gallery. We cannot blame the many for the sins of a few, but yet we cannot stifle the thought that it might have been possible for the majority instantly to rebuke the offenders.
