

Excise Department Puts Quietus on Wall Street Day-Sulzer Checks Old Gambling Club.

The Department of Excise has revoked the liceuse of the building on Bedford avenue which was formerly occupied by the Windsor Club and used as a gambling resort. This action probably sounds the death knell of a place which ran for fourteen years and was raided in the regimes of successive police commissioners. The credit for bringing this situation about belongs to "Honest Dan" Costigan, chief of Waldo's gambling squad, who raided the place several months ago and on the evidence obtained secured the conviction of "Manny" Cohen, the proprietor, who was sent away to serve a term of four months.
