

PENNSY GOLFERS LOSE CUP MATCH

Metropolitan Team Wins After Hard Contest in Lesley Tourney at Shore Hills

Travers and Fownes Have Battle Royal With Champion, Winning 2 Up--New York Meets Boston

SHORT HILLS, N. J., Sept. 25.—

While the Metropolitan team defeated Pennsylvania yesterday by 9 points to 6 in the first day of the annual Lesley Cup matches at the Baltusrol Club links, several of the contests hung by hairs-breadths, indicating that there was little difference in their strength.

The afternoon singles sent to New York 6 to 4, while the morning four-somes stood the same way by 3 to 2.

Accordingly New York will tomorrow meet Boston, bringing Jerome D. Travers against Francis Ounnet, which, over a course of that calibre, will make the contest almost as important as their recent meeting in the national championship. Interest today was mainly in the meeting between Travers and William C. Fownes, Jr., Pittsburgh ex-national and Pennsylvania champion, the former finally winning 2 up and 1 to go after a rather close call. They were square on the sixth.

Then the current turned, Travers taking four holes in succession, only to drop back until ending the fifteenth. He was only 1 up. A lost ball on the seventeenth gave him a streaked outlook, but he squaked through. Fownes lost the second hole by going out of bounds from tee and being short on second. Travers lost the third by twice failing to get up. Fownes' approach at the fourth hole should have given him that, but his putt was weak, so it was halved. Fownes lost the fifth by a short drive and missed a putt while Travers' superb approach landed him a birdie 3 there. Being in the rough twice, he was forced to pick up on the sixth for a par 4, while Fownes squared the match a second time with a birdie 3. Travers, roused, used an iron in place of a brassie for his second at the seventh and, sinking an 18-foot putt, gobbled the hole 4 to a regulation 5. Getting behind a tree on eighth cost Fownes that hole and he also lost the ninth on his putt, so he turned home 3 down. Travers had gone out one under par, while Fownes was four strokes worse.

An overapproach cost Fownes the tenth in par 4, for Travers plumped in a 20-foot putt for a birdie 3. Fownes, however, sank an 18 foot putt also for a birdie 3 at the eleventh. The Pittsburgher was 4 down again, though ending the 12th, which he surrendered after being in the pith and rough and then hopelessly short. Fownes won the 13th in a perfect 3 after Travers had rinned exasperatingly, and the 14th was a repetition of the 13th. Travers, missing a putt of not more than two feet for a birdie 4, gave Fownes that hole, so he was only one down. Fownes' poor second at the 16th cost him that, which left Travers dormie 2. Travers lost his ball on his drive at the 17th and not even the crowd could find it. Fownes, however, put his second there into a trap, so the halved hole gave Travers the match.

George A. Ormisten, Oakmont Club, Pittsburgh, like Fownes, beat Fred Herreshoff, Westbrook, 3 and 2. Herreshoff was never one up, although he did manage to square the match in the fourth.

Oswald Kirkley, Englewood, Metropolitan and New Jersey champion, accounted for Eben M. Byers, Allegheny, by 2 and 1.

Maxwell Marsten, Baltusrol, beat Cameron Buxton, Huntingdon Valley, 2 and 1. Marsten had rather the best of it going out but was one down on the 13th, while on the next they squared matters the third time. Of the remaining three Buxton halved one.

Gardner White, Flushing, disposed of Howard Perrin, Merton, by 2 and 1. The Philadelphian was never up but squared the match a second time on the eighth and then alternated between 3 and 2 down.

I. B. Crooksten, Pittsburgh, new star, beat August Kammer, Fox Hills, 1 up after being down all the way to the 15th, where they were square on the 17th. Kammer put his second into the road in an unplayable place.

Reggie Worthington, Shawnee, defeated Cornelius J. Sullivan, Baltusrol, 3 and 1. Sullivan won only the ninth going out, but halved four holes. The first four coming in were halved, Worthington lost the next two, but won the 16th and 17th. Card

J. B. Rose, Oakmont Club, Pittsburgh, the Princeton captain lost 4 down and 3 to go to Roy Webb, Englewood. Rose was never up, but turned home only 2 down. Card:
