

Pennsylvania Golfers Win in Lesley Cup Match—Enthusiasts Brave Rain at Two Local Horse Shows

PENNSYLVANIA GOLFERS DOWN MASSACHUSETTS After Leading in Foursomes Boston Team Is Badly Beaten in Singles.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 1.—Despite the threats of rain and the cold wind, which made the play on the first day of the Lesley Cup match on the links at the Merion Cricket Club most disagreeable, there was excitement enough to warm the chillest golfer in the land, for after being beaten in foursomes by four to one, Pennsylvania ran true to predicted form and by taking no less than seven of the singles matches turned a seeming defeat into a decisive victory. The final score was 8 to 7, in favor of the Philadelphia and Pittsburgh players.

The other contest, tried out for the first time in the history of the Metropolitan team of players over the so-called veterans by the wide margin of 11 to 4.

The morning play between Massachusetts and Pennsylvania was close and won three, losing at the twentieth hole in the other.
