


PHILADELPHIA NATIONALS WHO WILL PLAY BOSTON RED SOX FOR WORLD'S SERIES

NEW YORK GOLFERS
BEAT PENNSYLVANIAQuakers Are Overwhelmed in
Finals for Lesley Cup at
Marion Cricket Club.

Philadelphia, October 2.—New York overwhelmed Pennsylvania in the final of the Lesley Cup matches at the Marion Cricket Club, Haverford, today, 11 to 4. In the foursomes, in the morning, New York won 3 matches to 1, and in the singles in the afternoon Pennsylvania won but 2 matches to 10.

Bad as the heating was in the aggregate, many of the matches were very closely contested, and the losers can derive some consolation from the fact that New York had about the best team that has ever represented the State, and that the margin of victory in favor of the winners in the majority of the matches was by no means large.

In the foursomes, one match went to the nineteenth hole, one finished up on the eighteenth and two on the seventeenth, while in the singles one match finished up on the twentieth hole, one on the nineteenth, three on the eighteenth and three on the seven-

teenth.

Jerry Travers and Oswald Kirkby defeated W. C. Fowles Jr. and Davidson Herron in the four-somes; but if Fowles had been able to put a different face on the ball, he would have been halves, since his and the other team played very well in the first nine holes. Travers and Kirkby having four as and two 6's and their opponents 7, two 6's and a 5.

Both sides played better after the turn had been reached, where Travers and Kirkby were 1 up, while Fowles and Davidson were 1 down. The second half of the ninth, Travers and Kirkby came with a 5 and a 6, Fowles putting the second shot into the pit and Herron playing out with his niblick clean across the green. Travers brought off a remarkable shot on the eighteenth, which had up the second shot of the rough near the bunker to the left of the green, and Travers put his approach dead to the pin, leaving his partner an easy putt for a 5. As Herron had laid his approach dead, it had looked like a win instead of a half.

**SOLDIER BARTFIELD
OUTPOINTS KURTZ**

Soldier Bartfield of Brooklyn outpointed Young Dave Kurz of Newark in the half hour of ten rounds at the Broadway Sporting Club last night. It was one of the best nights ever staged in the local organization, both men being on their feet hammering away at each other throughout the entire ten rounds. Bartfield weighed 155½ pounds and Kurz 154½.

Bartfield employed a left jab to good advantage and landed the jabs repeatedly with this punch, followed by the clever boxer, but he had no brilliant idea in mind and came into play in order to win. Kurz defended almost entirely on his terrific left-hand swing. He was the harder puncher, but he missed more frequently than his Brooklyn rival.

The bout started off like a whirlwind and missed at least two easy punches, either one of which would have made a deal of difference in his score.
