

MRS. BARLOW WINS PINEHURST GOLF

Mrs. Faith of Wykagyl Gives Victor Battle of Her Life in Finals.

PINEHURST, N. C., March 25.—Mrs. W. J. Faith of the Wykagyl Club gave Mrs. Roland H. Barlow of the Merion Cricket Club the match of her life in today's final for the championship in the North and South golf championship for women. Mrs. Faith had a bit the best of it in the early stages of play, making the turn all even and winning the tenth and twelfth holes and losing the eleventh and thirteenth. A one under par, 4, won the 432-yard fourteenth hole for Mrs. Faith, who lost the 212-yard, fifteenth, to a 3. The long sixteenth accomplished her undoing.

Mrs. Faith's tee shot was a screamer, which carried over the trap which affords a short cut to the green by the narrowest kind of a margin. Mrs. Barlow, evidently thinking the task too great, played to the safety plot at the right, from which she got a splendid second. Mrs. Faith's second shot had just enough pull to land it behind a whisker bunker, over which she had to play her third shot and which cost her the stroke which lost the hole.

Mrs. Barlow's tee shot on the short seventeenth narrowly escaped one of the numerous pits which guard the green and her approach indicated timidity, but she holed a long putt for a 3, while Mrs. Faith, whose tee shot made one of the traps, lost a stroke in getting the ball into play which cost her the hole and the match by 2 and 1.

Mrs. H. R. Stockton of the Plainfield Club was the winner of the women's Southern Association medal in the championship consolation with a 3 and 2 victory over Miss Louise B. Elkins of Pittsburgh.

Miss Sarah Evans of Tedesco, Miss Florence Croft of Oakmont, Mrs. J. P. Williamson of Wyoming Valley, and Mrs. J. D. Hathaway of Montreal were other division winners.

Amateur champion Quimet recorded 73 for the amateur record on Course 3 in four-ball play this morning. In the afternoon on Court 2, which is generally conceded to be two and a half strokes easier, he made 76, through difficulty experienced in the last two holes.

E. M. Slayton of Intervale (34) recorded 71 net for the prize in today's Tin Whistle medal play.

Lesley Cup Golf at Merion Oct. 12.

Word was received yesterday from Philadelphia that the tri-State matches for the Robert W. Lesley Cup will be run off over the links of the Merion Cricket Club, Philadelphia, on Oct. 1 and 2. This is the same place selected by the women for their Griscom Cup matches early in June. Merion is the only club in this section of the United States having two eighteen-hole golf courses, so that in the contests between the crack players of Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, and the Metropolitan district it will be possible to play thirty-six different holes. No action has been taken as regards the proposal to change the foursomes style to four ball. This year's Lesley Cup matches will be the eleventh series.

N. Y. U. Juniors Down Seniors.

New York University juniors eliminated the seniors as the possible winners of the interclass basket ball championship of the university yesterday, defeating the fourth-year men by the score of 28 to 9.
