WILD GAME IN NEW YORK.

Sportsmen Can Get All the Fun They

Want Right. Here.

New York sportsmen are dally taking trains for the wildest parts of the State in the pursuit of quail, partridge, rabits, duck, and deer. The partridges are very scarce owing to the wet Spring, that killed the young birds, and deer shooting in this State is becoming iess satisfactory every year. If these gunners could get permission to shoot the quali, duck, and rabbits that abound in the northern part of the Bronx, within the city limits, they could bag more game after a 5-cent trolley ride than they can get now by a parior-car than they can get now by a parior-car the swamp during the period when the old duck is nesting and the young ducks helpless. But from the safety zone of the railroad track they can be seen tipping up for food, or preening their feather in the sun. The wary black duck is sometimes seen skulking in the shadews, and many malards pay the place a flying visit. Every Autumn the mergansers in full black and white plumage stop off in their migration and stay until the swamp freezes over. Many of the rare species also appear within the city limits. More canvastack duck were seen in one day on Jerome Park reservoir last Winter than were seen in any eastern part of the State for the last thirty years. From places where the quail was formerly, the most common game bird reports have come of one quail seen in the last seven years. Even last year, during the cold snap in February, C. H. Rogers of the Museum of Natural History found a dozen of the birds dead in Van Cortlandt swamp, where they had been frozen while sleeping in dinner plate fashion, in a circle, with the tais touching and heads out. But this year, in spite of the wet weather, predatory cats, and poaching Italians, they are more abundant than ever.

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
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
