Word has been received from Philadelphia that the Tri-State matches for the Robert W. Lesley Cup will be run off over the links of the Merion Cricket Club, Philadelphia, on October 1 and 2. This is the same place selected by the women for their Griscom Cup matches early in June. Merion is the only club in this section of the United States having two eighteen-hole golf courses, so that in the contests between the crack players of Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and the Metropolitan district, it will be possible to play thirty-six different

holes. No action has been taken as regards the proposal to change the four-some style to four ball. This year's Lesley Cup will be the eleventh series.
