Not even the most ardent of the New England golf enthusiasts had hoped for such a result as this, for the Metropol-tan District had sent out a formidable aggregation, while the absence of Ouimet, Sullivan, and Tewksbury seemed to portend utter defeat for the Massachusetts team. It has become such a habit with the New York golfers to take possession of the Lesley Cup with eight victories in twelve attempts
