The Bay State golfers' victory was well earned, for after winning four of the five foursomes they divided the points in the singles contests. The only pair to lose for Massachusetts was Sanford K. Sterne, of the Tathuck Country Club, of Worcester, and William C. Chick, of the Country Club. They were beaten by John G. Anderson, formerly of the Brae Burn Club, now a member of the Sivanoy Country Club, of Mount Vernon, N. Y., and John M. Ward, of Garden City, L. I.

Wykagyl Champion Is Defeated by W. H. Holston in Semi-Final of Annual Tournament.

The uncertainties of a game of golf were never better illustrated on the links of the Wykagyl Country Club than yesterday when in the semi-final round of the annual tournament for the club championship Theodore V. Bermingham, the holder, was eliminated by W. H. Holston. The score was close enough, as it was by a single hole that Mr. Holston triumphed. Seeing that the latter is handicapped at eight strokes on the club rating list, however, while Mr. Bermingham is one of those who play from scratch, the result was entirely unexpected. Mr. Bermingham was away off form and his medal score was probably nearer 90 than 80.
