

LESLEY CUP GOES BACK TO BOSTON WITH HUB GOLFERS

Massachusetts Representatives Manage to Nose Out Metropolitan Team 9 to 6

BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 30 — Three years ago at the County Club, Brookline, the Massachusetts team of golfers won the Lesley Cup golf trophy, one of the most important events of interest to those who follow the Scottish pastime, from the Pennsylvania aggregation by a score of 12 to 3. Today, over the same links at Clyde Park, Brookline, Massachusetts triumphed over the Metropolitan team from New York by a score of 9 to 6, after it was predicted that the New Yorkers would again win the cup, which has been competed for since 1905.

The Bay State golfers' victory was well earned, for after winning four of the five foursomes in today's play they split even in the singles contest after it appeared as though the chances of a win looked dubious.

In the morning the only pair to lose for Massachusetts was Sanford K. Sterne, of the Tatnuck Country Club, of Worcester, and William C. Chick, of the Country Club. They were beaten by John G. Anderson, formerly of the Braeburn Club, now a member of the Swanoy Club, of Mt. Vernon, N. Y., and John M. Ward, of Garden City, the former president of the Boston Braves, by 1 up.

The most important contest in the foursomes played had Ray Gorton, of Braeburn, and Fred J. Wright, of the

Albemarle Club, of Newtonville, opposed to A. J. Kammer and R. D. Webb. The former couple won by 3 and 2, after being 2 up at the turn. Gorton holed his iron shot to the tenth in this match the ball hitting the green six feet from the pin and then rolling in. B. W. Estabrook and C. M. Amory won an interesting match in this form of play from Dwight Partridge and F. W. Dyer by 1 up.

With a lead of four points to one and ten singles matches to be played, the chances for easy victory for Massachusetts looked very bright, but it was not until darkness settled over the links that the Bay Staters were sure of victory. The first four matches netted the Metropolitan players four points, but of the next six the home golfers asserted themselves and at the close of the play in singles had earned a five and five break.

Jesse P. Guilford and Oswald Kirkby, the Metropolitan and New Jersey titleholder had a close contest, with the latter leading by two up after nine holes had been completed. The next three holes were halved and Guilford won at the thirteenth. Both got fives at the fourteenth, and they alternated in winning the next two holes. Kirkby brought the match to an end at the seventeenth by getting a five to his opponent's six, Guilford socketing his second and being over the green on his third.

Fred Herreshoff and R. W. Brown had a good contest to the turn, with the Metropolitan leading by one up. At the tenth, Herreshoff increased to two up by being on the green from the tee, while Brown was over. Brown became three down at the eleventh by putting his second into the brook. They halved the next four holes, and Herreshoff won the short sixteenth, in 5 to 1, taking the contest by 4 and 2.
