

PLAN INTERCITY GOLF.

Strong Local Team for Next Lesley Cup Tournament.

Findlay S. Douglas, Captain of the Metropolitan Lesley Cup team, may have to look to his laurels this year, of course, assuming that the Golf Associations representing Philadelphia, Boston, and New York resume their intercity struggle. For that matter, the trophy is at present held by Massachusetts, though there is a feeling that, with the strongest representation possible to be mustered, the New York combination would be hard to beat.

The war has not robbed this section of much of its erstwhile playing strength, and were a team to be selected right now it would be possible to call upon the services of such well-known favorites as Jerome Travers, Oswald Kirkby, Max Marston, Gardiner White, John G. Anderson, and John M. Ward. Possibly by the time Fall rolls around some of those at present in service will be free. These include Philip Carter and Henry J. Topping, both in France, and Fred Herreshoff and Archie Reid, both of whom are in the army.

Then there is Reginald Lewis, who has been in the navy, also H. K. Kerr. Unquestionably the next metropolitan Lesley Cup team will have as one of its members A. L. Walker, Jr., the brilliant Richmond County Country Club golfer, who recently won the tournament at Pinehurst. Richard A. Haight, runner-up to Walker in the last interscholastic tournament at Nassau, is another possibility. No official word has been received as yet concerning the plans of the associations regarding the resumption of these intercity matches, but the general impression is that, like all other forms of competitive golf, they will again get under way.
