

TEWKESBURY MAKES GOLF SCORE OF 73

Turns In a Record Card in Preparation for Lesley Cup Matches Starting Today.

Golfing wizards from the New York metropolitan district, from Pennsylvania, and from Massachusetts, who have been gathered all this week at the National links at Southampton, L. I., will pair up today in singles matches and four-somes for the annual two-day tournament known as the Lesley Cup matches. In addition to the fact that this will be the first tri-district assembly on the links since 1916, when Massachusetts captured a leg on the valuable trophies at Brookline, the matches today and tomorrow carry greater flavor because of the presence on the Quaker dozen of S. Davidson Herron of Pittsburgh, the brand new national amateur champion. This is not only Herron's first appearance along the Atlantic seaboard since he won his title in August at Oakmont, but it is the first tournament since then, and the hundreds of Long Island golfing fans are eager to size up his style of play.

Today will bring the New Yorkers and the Pennsylvanians together, and the winner will clash tomorrow with the Bay Staters. Team scoring is on the Nassau system of points. Although the announcement has not been made definitely, there is every reason to believe Francis Oulmet will not play this year with the Down-Easters. He has been actively associated with business affairs in Maine recently, and he has played golf only at rare intervals. The status of Max R. Marston, New Jersey State champion, is also in doubt. Although he has always been a metropolitan player in past seasons, there is the persistent report this year that he will affiliate with the Quakers, since he has taken a membership in a Philadelphia club. Norman Maxwell, Overbrook, will not play with the Quakers because of his physician's orders, according to a telegram received from Philadelphia last night.

During a practice round Paul Tewkesbury of Aronimink, the qualifying medalist at Oakmont this year, yesterday set up a new course record at the National links. He equalled par figures of 73 for the first time since the famous course was constructed, and his feat left the watching New York and the Massachusetts men with astonished looking faces. Tewkesbury was playing in a threesome with Wood Platt, North Hills, and George Hoffner, Bala, two other members of the Pennsylvania team who rounded the course in an 80 and a 79, respectively.
