MRS. MALLORY IS EXTENDED TO WIN

Mrs. Robert Le Roy Forces Her Into Extra Sets in West Side Tennis Club Championship.

In one of the hardest matches she has had since her return to form Mrs. Franklin I. Mallory defeated Mrs. Robert Le Roy at Forest Hills yesterday and reached the title round of the West Side Tennis Club championship.

As usual, Mrs. Le Roy did not settle down to her best tennis until the greater part of a set had been completed. By the time the second division of play started, however, she had recovered control and was driving hard, low and almost to the base line.

Earlier in the day Mrs. Mallory eliminated Mrs. L. Millens Burt in the third round with the loss of only one game out of thirteen, 6-0, 6-1. Miss Eleanor Gray, who had been figured as the most likely finalist in singles against Mrs. Mallory, decided to defer her match, but she played in doubles, and with Mrs. E. Dible as her partner defeated Miss Florence Ballin and Mrs. L. Gouverneur Norris in a close match by a score of 6-3, 6-4.

SPORT LOVING JUDGES. WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Friday.—Justice Arthur S. Tompkins, of the New York Supreme Court, won a trotting race for a purse of \$200 at the White Plains Fair today, driving his own horse, Louise Guy.

EVANSVILLE, Ind., Friday.—For the benefit of fans who were compelled to attend court yesterday afternoon, Judge Philip C. Gould, who was presiding at a trial in circuit court here, announced the world series scores from the bench.

Racing over a track that was slow but drying three odds on favorites scored at Jamaica yesterday afternoon. One finished last in a four horse race. The successful odds-on propositions were Sasin, Koh-I-Noor and Georgie. The derelict was Right Angle.

On the first of these two holes Miss Stirling had tried to carry the ravine in front of the green by a short drive. She failed and paid the penalty. On the other hole the champion began by pulling within a couple of inches of the out of bounds markers. 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In the third race, a selling affair of a mile and a quarter, Sasin, Monomy and John I. Day were the starters. Sasin was backed from 4 to 5 to 9. After having led the last mile he beat Monomy about five inches. The judges said while it was exceedingly close there was sufficient margin for a positive decision.

At the head of the short stretch Sasin had a lead of a little more than a length. Three-sixteenths of the stand on Monday were closing on Sasin. Thence to the finish there were six starters, of which Georgia was a 11 to 20 favorite. When three-sixteenths had been run Davidson assumed command. In the last sixteenth he struck him in the last stride.
