N. Y. U. ENGAGES ITS OWN STAR AS COACH

Floyd Egan, All Around Athlete, Quits Amateur Ranks to Take Charge of Nine.

RIGHT LEG IS INJURED

Made Enviable Record at Basketball, Football, Baseball and Athletics.

Athletics at New York University racelved a severe blow last week when it became known that Flord J. Egan, the Violet's star all around athlete, would be unable to ever compete again in intercollegiate athletics. The reason for this is that Fgan has been engaged to coach the varsity baseball team at the University Heights institution as & paid man, and so has left the ranks of the "simon pures" to become a professional, which bars him from competition in any intercollegiate sport.

Egan's retirement from active participation in athletic contests has been expected by those who knew him well. and it was simply a matter of time as to when it would take place. A gradual weakening in his right leg, due to the loss of the heel bone in the right foel but a mere boy, has slowed the great athlete up perceptibly this last year. The intensive strain that the injured leg has been forced to undergo has finally gotten the best of it so that Egan was compelled to retire at the close of

the basketball season, Despite this severe handicap, Egan's path as an athlete at the local college has been one great victory after another.
