Fowkes, Jr., of Pittsburgh, veteran of a hundred tournaments. Fowkes seldom concedes a putt, no matter how short, and he doesn't care to have any conceded to him. That is golf.

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Norman McCall, of Overbrook and White-marsh, is not that off his game at present, as the result of his recent inactivity on the links.

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Jesse Street, the New York youth, is being picked by the critics hereabouts as a sure-enough "comer," because of his brilliant work in the Lesley Cup matches.
