


Sid started it by finishing third in the Empire City Marathon at Yonkers on New Year's Day. Bob Fowler, of the Cambrideport Gym, and John Daly, the Irish-American A.C. veteran, were the only two to show

their heels to the Chicagoan. Then Sid hiked back to Chicago and on the following January 17 raced to victory in the big Marathon held through the streets of Chicago under the auspices of the Chicago American. Only a Rocky Mountain goat could be sure of his footing on the frozen slippery streets, but Sid covered the full twenty-six miles 355 yards in 3:15:15. None of his competitors was in halling distance.

Two 100-Mile Races. Then Sid hit the trail back to Chicago and in the Marathon in Riverview Park, Chicago, March 25, 1909, he captured first place in the corking time of 2:41:00 1-5. On the 25th of the following July on the same track Hatch covhours 7 minutes 2! seconds. His ninety, five mile run from Milwaukee to Chicago in 11:30:00 in 1916 was an even more brilliant performance, however, Following his 100-mile race Sid did not rest on his laurels very long. On November 5, 1800, he answered the call to post in another Marathon in Riverview Park, Chicago, and ran the hearts out of a big field, crossing the finish
