## Semi-Finals for the National Soccer Cup

Eastern Match to Be Played at Pawtucket on Saturday—Southern New York Pairings

At a special meeting of the National Challenge Cup Committee of the United States Football Association grounds and officials for the semi-finals of the National Soccer Cup were named. It was decided to stage the Eastern semi-final between the Robins, of Newark, and Four River of Quincy, Mass., at Coats Field. Pawtucket, R. I., Saturday, kick-off 8:15; P. M.; James E. Schofield of New Haven, Conn., will have charge of the game, and the appointed linesmen are Edward Powers, of Pawtucket, and Vincent Dawson of Central Falls, R. I.

As the remaining game in the fifth round between the Packards of Detroit and the Rochester City Moose of Rochester, N. Y., will not be played until next Sunday at Detroit, it was decided to give the emergency committee power to select the emergency officials for the Western semi-final next week, or when a decision has been reached. The winners of the game will have to face the crack Ben Mather team of St. Louis.

At a meeting of the Southern New York State Football Association, Inc., last night for the third round of the cup competition and resulted as follows: Teke Yacht Basin vs. Newburgh Shipyard, at Todd's Field, Brooklyn; Longfellow vs. Culan MacDuffe, at Ridgewood Baseball Park, Brooklyn; Morse Dry Dock vs. Astoria, at Astoria, L. I.; Morse Dry Dock or White Rose vs. New York. The ties will be staged next Sunday, a double-header being set for decision at Todd's Field, Brooklyn.

### Montclair A. C. Wins Title

The Montclair Athletic Club repeated its success of last season by again winning the New York and New Jersey Soccer League championship without losing a single game. Eight teams tested their strength in the meet, of which it won five and drew three.

The Richmond County team also went through the campaign without being defeated, but in five of the tussles had to be contented with sharing the points. Montclair, as winner of the league, will meet the winner of the Philadelphia league—the Merion C. C.—in the annual inter-city game for the Crescent Challenge Cup at Haverford on April 24.

Next Saturday at Philadelphia the Staten Island F. C. will play the University of Pennsylvania team at Philadelphia, while a week later Montclair A. C. will try conclusions with the Staten Island F. ### Public School Swimmers Will Compete for Trophy

Annual Championship to Be Held Saturday at College of the City of New York

On Saturday morning the Public Schools Athletic League will conduct the annual swimming championships for the pupils of the elementary schools at the College of the City of New York pool. Entries have been received from schools in all boroughs of Greater New York.

An extremely large number of contestants have registered for the four individual events and one relay race. These events are divided into four weight classifications as follows: 40 yards for 85 pounds class, 40 yards for 100 pounds class, 50 yards for 115 pounds class, 50 yards for unlimited weight, and a four-lap relay for both of any weight.

During the past two years swimming among the boy students of the public school system has become one of the major sports of the Public Schools Athletic League. This has been caused by the unlimited amount of practice which these embryo swimmers have been receiving in the many pools installed in the public school buildings; also the use of the public pools extended to the school boys through the courtesy of the Department of Public Buildings and Offices.

Interest is keen among the various swimming teams in the ultimate result of the team championship for which a trophy has been donated by Arthur McLean, captain of the New York A. C. This trophy will be awarded to the team scoring the greatest number of points in the meet. Last year this trophy and championship was won by Public School 40, Manhattan.

### Auto Trucks Do Damage to Connecticut Highways

Traffic So Heavy That Roads May Not Stand Up Long Under Wear

HARTFORD, Conn., April 8.—Damage to Connecticut's system of highways by motor truck traffic the past winter and this spring has been very heavy, according to State Highway Commissioner C. J. Bennett, in a letter he addressed to manufacturers to-day. He asked shippers to restrict the maximum load on motor trucks to the legal limit of 10,000 pounds, and during the spring to include the truck in a limit of eight tons.

Motor traffic between industrial centers in Connecticut and New York City, Boston and Providence has reached a record of proportionate. The through traffic from New York and points beyond to Boston has been damaged by the war because of railroad conditions, so large and loads so heavy that the State's present trunk highway construction may not long stand up under it.
