Semi-Finals for the National Soccer Cup Eastern Match to Be Played at Pawtucket on Saturday—Southern New York Pairings

At a special meeting of the National Challenge Cup Committee of the United States Football Association grounds and officials for the semi-finals of the National Soccer Cup were held. It was decided to stage the Eastern semi-final between the Robins Dry Dock and Fore River of Quincy, Mass., at Pawtucket, N. J., on Saturday, April 10, at 2 P. M. James E. Schofield of New Haven, Conn., will have charge of the game, and the appointed lineups are Edward Pemberton of Pawtucket and Vincent Dawson of Central Falls, R. I.

As the remaining game in the fifth round between the Packard of Detroit and the Rochester City Moose of Rochester, N. Y., will not be played until next Sunday at Detroit, it was decided to give the emergency committee power to select the grounds and officials for the Western semi-final next week, or when a decision has been reached. The winners of the match will play the crack Ben Miller team of St. Louis.

At a meeting of the Southern New York Football Association pairings were made for the third round of the cup competition and resulted as follows: Tebo Yacht Basin vs. Newburgh Shipyard, at Todd's Field, Newburgh; Longfellow vs. Manhattan Duffs, at Riverside Baseball Park, Brooklyn; Morse Dry Dock vs. Astoria, at Astoria, La.; Robins Dry Dock or White Rose vs. New York. The ties will be staged next Sunday, a double-header being set for decision at Todd's Field, Brooklyn.

Plans for Lesley Cup Matches at Merion, Pa.

Tri-City Tournament Will Be Held on Cricket Club Course on October 1 and 2

Culver Golfers from this district and Massachusetts who are chosen as the members of the Lesley Cup team this year will have an opportunity to familiarize themselves with the Merion Cricket Club course prior to the competition if they so desire. The date for this tri-city match, which brings together combinations representing Massachusetts, Pennsylvania and the Metropolitan District, are October 1 and 2. Probably the "championship" course at Merion will be the one used solely for this meeting.

The opportunity to practice will be given in the invitation tournament scheduled for the Merion Cricket Club September 29 and 30, two days before the Lesley matches. This year conditions for the invitation event will call for seventy-two holes of metal play, thirty-six holes each day. The former course will have an eighteen-hole qualifying round, followed by match play.

Pennsylvania, which won the Tri-City Cup last year, will have as strong a team in the field this season. The Keystone State had on its line-up such men as S. Davidson Heron, the national champion; W. C. Fowles, the captain; Max Marston, the New Jersey champion; Eben M. Byers, erstwhile national title-holder; Pat Grant, Pennsylvania champion, and others of like caliber.

Penn Holds Trophy Pennsylvania defeated the Metropolitan team on the first day, 9 points to 6. On the second day Pennsylvania defeated the Massachusetts team, 10 to 5. The Bay State line-up, weakened by the absence of Frank Outimet and Jesse Gullford, never had a chance to retain the cup, which it had won in 1918. Last year was the first since 1912 that Pennsylvania gained possession of the cup, put up by Robert Lesley, president of the Golf Association of Philadelphia.
