FIVE SIXTEENS IN BALA INVITATION

Before all this comes to pass, however, the cracks, the near-cracks and the just plain "duffers" will have their chance at Bala-from tomorrow until Saturday, inclusive. Here is one of the most popular, if not the most popular, invitation tournament in the Philadelphia golf year, from a local viewpoint. They have only nine holes at Bala, but those nine holes are interesting holes, and the hospitality of the organization

There will be only fire sixteens for the very good reason that the course will accommodate no more. Therefore the qualifying round tomorrow will be of unusual interest in that the field is so large that every contestant, barring the handful of stars who habitually make the first and second flights, will be on the anxious bench all the way.

and on Saturday the semi-finals and finals. A FORTUNATE SELECTION OF DATES

The Bala officials were particularly fortunate in their selection of dates, for the tournament comes at a moment when Philadelphia golfers are famishing for action. Not since the invitation event at Llanerch, more than a month ago, has there been anything moving of major importance on links bereabouts.

let it be noted that we employ the word "fortunate" in the above rather than "sie;" for be it known that the Bala folks had an August date sort of forced on them. Originally they selected dates which conflicted with the District Amateur Championship. When the matter was called to their attention they promptly elected to make a change, and as all of the available fall dates were taken up they decided on August 25, 26, 27 and 28.

They could not have done better, but permit it to be recorded that Bala could put on a tournament in bleak December, and probably get a full entry

The latter club, like Huntingdon Valley, has not yet chosen opponents for the two stars. It would be a graceful tribute to Philadelphia golf if Huntingdon Val-

ley and Aronimink selected two strictly local players to oppose the famous and Britons. To see Vardon, Ray, Evans and Marston in a links struggle will brions. To see varous, may, trains and massoon in a mass struggle will be a golf feast par excellent, and the Merion Club is to be congratulated for arranging such a wonderful match. Nevertheless, if the promoters of international exhibition matches here are inspired by civic patriotism to offer a golf spectacle for Philadelphia devotees, it is obvious that their purpose can best be served by putting local players in competition with the two men recognized everywhere as the world's leading exponents of links game.

There are pairs in Philadelphia capable of extending Vardon and Ray. To see them in competition with the two Englishmen would be an engaging exhibition as well as a source of gratification and pride to every follower of golf in this city. A boost for Philadelphia golf is a boost for Philadelphia.
