

Mineville-Granville Tiff Definitely Set for Thanksgiving Day, Derby Park

OFFICIALS DECIDE TO STAGE BATTLE AT HUDSON FALLS

Coach Eppolito of Granville Completes Final Arrangements for Big Attraction

TEAMS TO DRILL HARD

Mineville Closes Schedule Tomorrow at Silver Bay; Granville's Schedule Is Finished

The 1929 grid classic of northern New York, bringing together the championship teams of Granville and Mineville High schools, will be staged the afternoon of Thanksgiving day, commencing at 2:30, at Derby Park, Hudson Falls.

Definite announcement to this effect was made last night by Coach Samuel Eppolito of the Granville High eleven, winners of the northern conference of the North Eastern New York Public High school league.

Granville First Mentioned Tentative arrangements for the anticipated bitter struggle, exclusively announced in *The Post-Star* yesterday morning, called for the game to be played at Granville, but after further consideration yesterday the committee in charge made the decision to play at Derby park, where the enclosed field will make it possible for the two teams to greatly benefit in a financial way. The Granville field is not enclosed and fans gain entrance through no one established gate such as at Derby park.

As announced yesterday morning, everything was set for the game with the exception of the official consent of the Granville faculty. This was granted yesterday.

The battle between the northern conference champs and Mineville, winners of the Essex county league, was proposed by the sports editor of *The Post-Star* because of the excellent records boasted by each at the conclusion of their regular league schedules. The proposal was followed by a challenge from Coach Eppolito of Granville, of the northern eleven, to either Granville or Whitehall.

The Mineville squad, which in eight games has scored a total of 337 points to their opponents' twenty, will end their regular 1929 schedule tomorrow afternoon when they meet the Silver Bay Prep eleven at Silver Bay. Granville closed its regular schedule Monday afternoon of this week by defeating Fair Haven, Vt. High, 21 to 7, running its total points, both league and non-league, to 122 in eight games.

Already Seeking Officials Granville's goal line was crossed but twice, once by Tamer, of Whitehall, in the final conflict and once by a Fair Haven player Monday of this week.

An attempt is being made to obtain Murphy of Whitehall, "Freddie" Burns of Hudson Falls and a prominent Albany official to handle the Thanksgiving day game.

Granville's squad came out of the crucial contest at Whitehall last Saturday in good shape. Coach Eppolito said last night, with the exception of Beecher, star tackle, who was unable to play in the Fair Haven game two days later. With two weeks before the Thanksgiving day battle, Coach Eppolito hopes to have the big tackle back in shape and ready for action against the ore town warriors.

Both Coaches Eppolito and Davidson will give their proteges intensive workouts next week and the three days following week prior to Thanksgiving day in preparation for the classic. As neither team has any scheduled games after tomorrow until Thanksgiving, it is expected they will be pitted against the jayvees in several scrimmages.

CONSIDER PAYING AMATEUR GOLFERS TOURNEY EXPENSES

U. S. Association to Decide Paying Expenses in Lesley Cup Matches

MANY FAVOR PROPOSAL

Matches Involve Competition in Mass., Penn., N. Y. and Canada

NEW YORK, Nov. 14 (AP)—The United States Golf association at its quarterly meeting today, considered the question of associations paying the expenses of amateur golfers competing in the annual Lesley cup matches, a competition involving Massachusetts, Pennsylvania, New York and Canada.

No decision was announced, but indications were that the question will be decided by a pronouncement from the U. S. G. A. within the next two weeks.

The meeting brought the members of the executive committee, with one exception, to New York City. R. Johnston, the amateur champion, was absent. Robert T. Jones, Jr., the open champion and other star players, represented by the executive committee, attended.

The Massachusetts delegation, vigorously seeking the right to pay the expense of its Lesley Cup players, was headed by Alvah W. Hydstrom, president of the state association. The Pennsylvania association was represented by its president, E. L. Leblinger, and two Metropolitan Golf association officials participated in the early discussion. Walter Z. Frazer, of the Pennsylvania and John A. Ladds, president-elect.

Acting as spokesman for the three associations, Mr. Hydstrom said that he and his associates considered it unfair for the U. S. G. A. to pay expenses of Walker Cup players, who have biennial matches with Granville, Mineville, Hudson Falls and other players on state teams. He pointed out also that golfers participating in the annual intercollegiate and public links championships also are permitted to receive expenses.

The officers of the U. S. G. A. held sessions morning and afternoon but upon adjournment late in the day gave no suggestion of the decision to be returned later.

Cornell's Season Made or Unmade Tomorrow

In view of the fact that Cornell's season will be made or unmade, and particularly because of the fact that we expect to be on hand when the hostilities start, we are unusually interested in tomorrow's game at Hanover, N. H., between Gil Doble's thus far unbeaten and untied Cornell warriors and a Dartmouth team minus Al Marsters, one of the great backs of the season.

Although the team lacks the color that the great Marsters gave it, Dartmouth in its grueling battle with Brown last Saturday, while Cornell was loafing with Western Reserve, showed that it is still formidable enough to give the Dobleites plenty of worryment. But there is a question whether its long string of hard games, including Harvard and Yale, will not have taken some of the zip out of the Green's attack.

Perhaps the dope will favor Dartmouth, though the Ithacans seldom have had such a chance for an upset. We believe Cornell will find a tougher opponent in the quest against which Yale and Harvard found plenty of trouble than it will in its annual game against Penn Thanksgiving day.

Tomorrow's game is the thirteenth meeting between the teams and the eleventh in succession. Dartmouth has the edge in victories by having won seven games to Cornell's five. It may be that the thirteenth season will prove unlucky for the Hanover delegation.

Northern Conference Review

A survey of last year's final standings in the northern tier of the North-eastern New York Public High school league reveals that not one of the teams finished in the same order as they did in the schedule just closed. Most startling was the case of Hudson Falls. Hudson Falls, who came up a bit, emerging from the cellar berth of 1928 to tie Glens Falls for fourth this year.

Granville played brilliant football the entire year, led by Art (Greek) Pagano, tackle, and thus took a jump from third place in 1928 to the top of the heap.

Saratoga, like Hudson Falls, went farther down the line, although not in such disastrous fashion as the Washington county clan. A tie last year in Saratoga's winning squad now and it won't be so long either, in our opinion.
